## What is Symposium Plus?

Tufts CTSI's Symposium Plus program is designed to launch promising research ideas and teams through an interactive half-day symposium and to coach these teams toward a full funding proposal within **one year** of the symposium.

## Why Participate?

The Symposium Plus program has helped past project teams meet new collaborators and develop new proposals which has led to enhanced funding of qualified projects since 2014. Selected research teams:

- Will receive project-specific tailored feedback from a diverse audience of about 40-50 individuals, including technical and methodological experts, symposium participants, and community or patient representatives through workshops and breakout discussions
- Projects may be eligible for a small planning grant to assist with project start-ups such as project
  planning or stakeholder meetings. Note: Funding will be made available at the discretion of the Tufts
  CTSI Research Collaboration Team after proposals are selected and presented. No budget is required
  with proposal submissions.

## Addiction Research: Spring 2019 Symposium Plus Request for Proposal (RFP)

## **Proposal Submission Guidelines**

## **Topics**

The two-page research concept proposals should address one of the following topics in clinical and translational research (including community based strategies):

- Addiction prevention strategies to prevent a variety of addictions including alcohol, illicit substances, cigarette smoking, and gambling. This could include examining risk factors (e.g. clinical, demographic, genetic), social determinants, metabolic pathways, brain function, etc.
- Addiction treatment social, psychological, drug treatment (new and existing), other novel approaches

#### Format:

- Approximately 1000 words, single spaced, no longer than two pages
- One inch margins
- Arial 11 font
- Structured summary (Background, Specific Aims, Approach, Significance, Innovation)

## **Minimum Requirements**

- The submitting investigator at a Tufts CTSI partner/collaborator organization is willing to lead further project development.
- Project has clear application to human health and meets definition of translational research found here: http://www.tuftsctsi.org/about-us/what-is-translational-science.
- Demonstrates some key aspect of implementation and dissemination.
- Is clearly translational i.e., is not basic research.

#### **Ideal Proposal Attributes**

To foster a diversity of study methods and approaches, proposed projects should be responsive to some of the following study design attributes:

- Addresses a challenging and important health problem i.e., balances risk with impact.
- Identifies one or more potential funding sources for the proposed project.
- Is conducted in a variety of care settings (not exclusively in academic settings)
- Provides clear metrics of success
- Uses electronic health record (EHR) infrastructure for at least part of the data collection
- Prospective data collection preferred, but evaluation of retrospective data also relevant
- Uses patient-reported or community-centered outcomes
- Compares or evaluates different experimental methods and/or uses pragmatic clinical trial design methodology
- Quasi-experimental in intervention assignment
- Compares or evaluates alternative methods of consenting patients, consumers and communities.
- Uses rigorous design that includes a relevant comparison group
